OWNER, RE/MAX UNLIMITED





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atie Kinder DeBauche devoted over a decade to raising money for some of the area's most worthy

missions including the San Antonio Food Bank, the San Antonio Library Foundation and the Witte Museum.

But in 2021, Kinder DeBauche decided to make a change and launched Kinder+DeBauche, a consulting firm aimed at helping nonprofits raise money.

"After the pandemic, I felt like I needed some sort of reset," she said, explaining that Covid-19 had changed a lot about nonprofit fundraising. Kinder+DeBauche was created to help nonprofits navigate those changes through general consulting, strategic planning, grant writing and fundraising.

Kinder DeBauche is driven to make a difference in San Antonio and to impact positive change through her work.

For this reason, she rose to the top of this year's 40 Under 40 list and has been named the San Antonio Business Journal's 2024 Woman of the Year.

For Kinder DeBauche, San Antonio is home. She attended Saint Mary's Hall, earned her degree in Latin American studies from the University of Texas at Austin and was bound for a career in politics beginning with winning a spot in the Bill Archer Fellowship Program.

After moving to Washington, D.C., and working as a congressional fellow for former San Antonio Congressman Charlie Gonzalez, Kinder DeBauche said she thought she'd move into lobbying.

She applied for and won a highly competitive and lucrative position with one of the top lobbying firms in Washington.

"I quit on the first day," she said. "I came to the realization that I wasn't ready for that—to be a lobbyist yet."

Kinder DeBauche decided to come back to San Antonio. She found her way into fundraising through her work in politics, she said. She was a campaign staffer for Dan DeBauche, now her husband, who at the time was the campaign manager for a state representative candidate. Dan DeBauche was looking to hire a fundraiser as part of that campaign, and Kinder DeBauche volunteered.

"That was when I realized I really liked fundraising," she said. "I like the competitiveness. I like the challenge of making budget. I loved it all. I loved the

Kinder DeBauche said her work at the Food Bank became particularly challenging in the wake of Hurricane Harvey. Food Bank staffers were working around the clock and fundraising efforts were focused on assisting those most affected.

"Even [in] the most challenging events, I learned things I could take with me to handle the next hard challenge better."

When she launched Kinder+DeBauche in 2021, one of the first clients to sign on was the Witte Museum.


Her client list now includes the Youth Orchestras of San Antonio, Our Lady of the Lake University, The Public Theater, Sunset Ridge Collective, The Conservation Society and the San Antonio Museum of Science and Technology.

"Fundraising is so tangible," Kinder DeBauche said. "When it's working it can really impact change. I play a small role in that and I love it."

arker Hensley arew up in San Antonio and began mixing and mingling with area business leaders

at a young age alongside his dad, who is an executive with HoltCat.

After graduating from Reagan High School, Hensley first thought he wanted to study engineering, but switched gears and earned his bachelor's degree in accounting from the University of Evansville, a small private university in the Midwest.

"I felt like I liked accounting and I thought it was a good thing, but I also knew I'd never be an accountant." Hensley said, pointing out that he never intended to remain behind a desk.

Instead, Hensley took his love of people, his accounting know-how and his longstanding relationships in the Alamo City's business community and has built a successful career in banking. first at Amegy Bank and now as the market president of Bank of Texas.

He's a rising star in the banking community, and he's already shown himself to be a collaborative leader with a progressive outlook on the opportunities presented in Texas banking. He also has a heart for giving back and has served on the board of directors for Junior Achievement of South Texas for eight years and is a member of the Valero Texas Open Trailblazers Organization.

It's these qualities that propelled him to the top of this year's 40 Under 40 list and earned him the title of the San Antonio Business Journal's 2024 Man of the Year.

Hensley said he was drawn to banking because he likes to help people.

"I like people," he said. "I like getting to know people and learning things. Some of the most intimate conversations people have are with their lawyer, their accountant or their banker."

Hensley began his banking career with an internship at Amegy Bank that later led to his promotion to senior vice president, one of the youngest bankers promoted to senior vice president in Amegy's history.

In June, he was recruited to join the Bank of Texas and tasked with growing its San Antonio footprint.

Parker runs the day-to-day operations, leads a team of bankers and manages the bank's growth strategy. He also manages all lines of business for the bank's parent company, BOK Financial.

"When I found out Parker was going to be leading the charge for Bank of Texas in San Antonio, I knew it was going to be a very successful enterprise and I quickly got on board," Craig Dixon, senior vice president of corporate banking at Bank of Texas, said in Hensley's nomination for 40 Under 40. "To leave a bank with over 23 years of tenure to work for someone 30 years my junior probably tells you everything you need to know about my respect for Parker."

Hensley said leadership can be hard to define.

"I think there's no manual for leadership," he said. "I think everyone has their own way to lead."

A leader's job is to make everyone else's job easier, whether it's the CEO or a janitor, he said.






